1 Worked examples

Study these first. Each one shows the method for a task used later.

■ Objections in passing

"Although the trial was small, the effect was consistent across all three sites." The objection is granted and disposed of in six words, and the main clause carries the point.

■ Conditionals

"If the funding continues, the scheme pays for itself by year four" states a precise limit. The condition is visible and testable, which is what a qualified claim requires.

■ Structure fighting meaning

"Although the scheme works, it is expensive" tells the reader that expense is the point. If the writer supports the scheme, the structure argues against them.
