1. **change as they read**

An argument that has just conceded is read by a slightly different reader.

2. **before the case it protects**

The reader who then reads your claim has already decided you are fair.

3. **word choice; syntax; conventions**

Style is the **mix** of the first three; length is not a component.

4. **the reader is a stranger who may not catch the gap**

A missed irony reads as an error, and you cannot explain yourself afterwards.

5. **qualify; clarify; specify**

Concluding is not a modifier's job.

6. **whatever is nearest to it**

That is why misplacement changes the claim without announcing it.

7. **similes; metaphors; analogies**

Anecdotes complete the list; statistics are evidence, not a comparison.

8. **False**

It must borrow something the reader accepts; if it borrows what they dispute, it concedes the argument.

9. **a difference between what is said and what is meant**

Or between what is expected and what occurs — either way, it is a **gap**.

10. **word choice; syntax; conventions**

Those three are what style is made of.
