2.1

- all three enlarged the state and differed over why it might command rather than whether

2.2

- change: the state does and claims far more; continuity: the question of the basis on which a state may command

2.3

(a)

- democracy-consent; communism-a theory of history; fascism-nation and race

(b)

- no war outcome could settle a question the three answered on different grounds

3.1 B

- the ground, not the fact, was in dispute

3.2 B

- 4.3's social contract posed it

3.3

(a)

- that wartime state expansion became permanent

(b)

- the range of what the state routinely does has grown, which is a change in the relationship even though the institution's name is unchanged
