1. exchange rate effect

AD covers every good, so there is no substitution — the three macro effects explain the slope.

2. 1

Every extra dollar is either spent or saved, so $MPC + MPS = 1$.

3. nominal wages are sticky, so a higher price level raises profit per unit

With wages locked in, a higher price level means more profit per unit, so firms produce more.

4. vertical at full-employment output

In the long run output depends on real resources, not the price level, so LRAS is vertical.

5. AD crosses SRAS

Where AD meets SRAS, the output demanded equals the output supplied in the short run.

6. a higher price level and higher output

Along the upward SRAS, more demand raises both price and output — price and output move together.

7. M

$AD = C + I + G + \text{net exports } (X - M)$.

8. 4

Spending multiplier $= 1 \div (1 - 0.75) = 1 \div 0.25 = 4$.

9. sticky

Sticky nominal wages are the key reason SRAS slopes upward.

10. GDP

Potential GDP is the output at full employment, at the natural rate of unemployment.

■ Aggregate demand

The total quantity of real output all buyers want at each price level.

■ Why AD slopes down

- **Wealth effect** — a lower price level raises the real value of money.
- **Interest rate effect** — lower prices lower interest rates, boosting investment.
- **Exchange rate effect** — lower prices make exports cheaper.

■ Components and shifts

$AD = C + I + G + (X - M)$. A change in any component (e.g. confidence, interest rates, expectations) **shifts** the whole AD curve.

Part A

Draw a correctly labeled graph of the aggregate demand, short-run aggregate supply, and long-run aggregate supply curves for Micanapy, and show each of the following.

- i. The current equilibrium real output and price level, labeled Y_1 and PL_1 , respectively
- ii. The full-employment real output, labeled Y_F

Part B

Assume that policymakers take no action to close the inflationary gap. Explain how Micanapy's economy will self-adjust to full employment in the long run.

Part C

Suppose instead that Micanapy's central bank is considering using monetary policy to close the inflationary gap in the short run. The banking system in Micanapy has limited reserves.

1 Worked examples

Study these first. Each one shows the method for a question type used later.

■ MPC and MPS

MPC is the fraction of extra income **spent**; MPS is the fraction **saved**; $MPC + MPS = 1$.

■ The spending multiplier

$$\text{multiplier} = \frac{1}{1 - MPC} = \frac{1}{MPS}.$$

A higher MPC gives a larger multiplier.

■ Change in GDP

$\Delta GDP = \text{multiplier} \times (\text{initial change in spending})$. With $MPC = 0.8$, the multiplier is $\frac{1}{0.2} = 5$.

 - (b) Assume that the Federal Reserve targets a new federal funds rate to reach full employment. Should the Federal Reserve target a higher or lower federal funds rate?
 - (c) Given the Federal Reserve action you identified in part (b), draw a correctly labeled graph of the money market and show the effect on the nominal interest rate.
 - (d) The policy makers pursue a fiscal policy rather than the monetary policy in part (b). Assume that the marginal propensity to consume is 0.8 and the value of the recessionary gap is \$300 billion.
 - (i) If the government changes its spending without changing taxes to eliminate the recessionary gap, calculate the minimum required change in government spending.
 - (ii) If the government changes taxes without changing government spending to eliminate the recessionary gap, will the minimum required change in taxes be greater than, smaller than, or equal to the minimum required change in government spending in part (d)(i) ? Explain.
 - (e) Assume the government lowers income tax rates to eliminate the recessionary gap. Will each of the following increase, decrease, or stay the same?
 - (i) Aggregate demand. Explain.
 - (ii) Long-run aggregate supply. Explain.

Discretionary fiscal policy needs a **deliberate new law** (e.g. a stimulus package); stabilizers act on their own.
