Method — Two migrations

Large numbers of international migrants moved to industrializing Northern cities, while many Americans moved west of the Appalachians, developing thriving new communities along the Ohio and Mississippi rivers.

Method — Three-part effect

The growth of manufacturing drove a significant increase in prosperity and standards of living **for some**; this led to **a larger middle class, a small but wealthy business elite**, and **a large and growing population of laboring poor**.

Method — Supporting themselves

Increasing numbers of Americans, especially women and men working in factories, no longer relied on semi-subsistence agriculture; instead they supported themselves producing goods for distant markets. Wage work replaced growing one's own food.

Method — Gender and family

Gender and family roles changed in response to the market revolution, particularly with the growth of definitions of domestic ideals that emphasized the separation of public and private spheres. The separation is a product of the economic change, not a survival from before it.

Method: Gender and family

Worked steps

(a) the household depends on wages rather than on its own production **B1**. (b) its food supply now depends on employment and prices it does not control **B1**, so a distant market failure reaches the family table **B1**.
