Objective

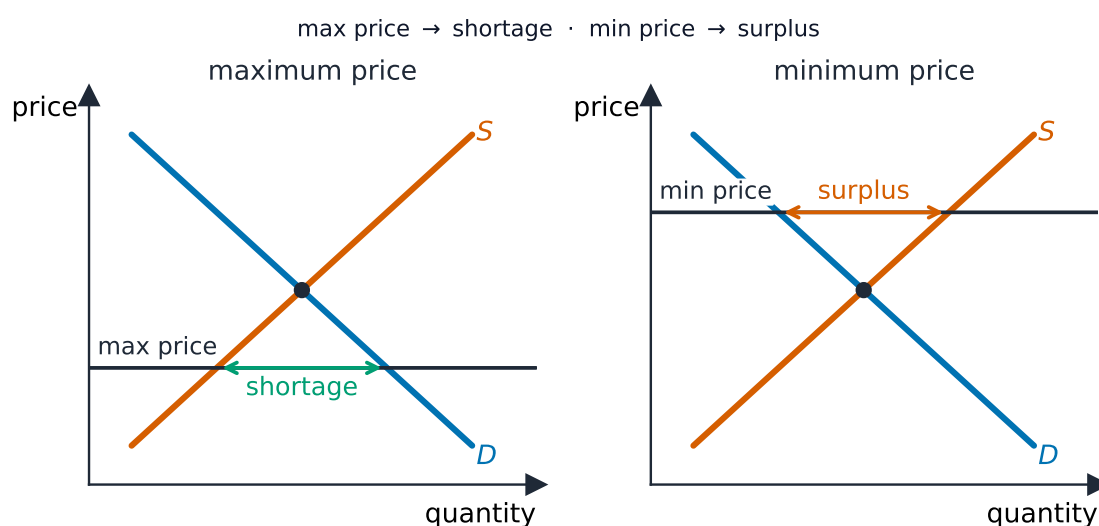

1 Worked examples

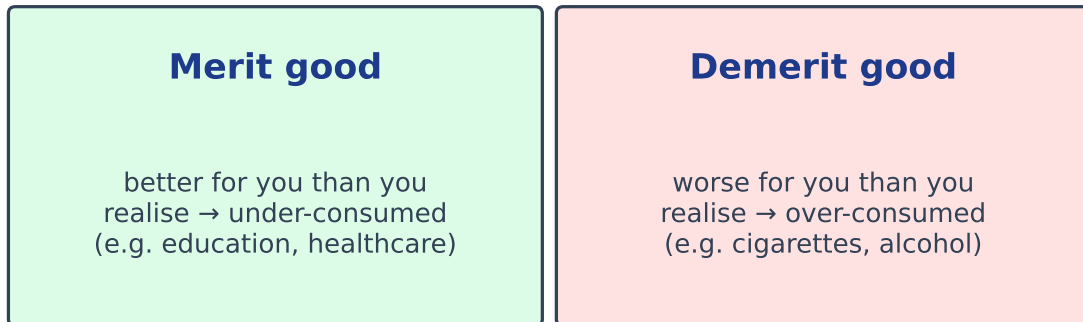
■ Government intervention



A mixed economy has both a private and a public sector

- **Mixed economy** 混合经济: a **private sector** 私营部门 (price mechanism) + a **public sector** 公共部门 (government).

- **Maximum price** 最高价格 (below equilibrium) → a shortage. **Minimum price** 最低价格 (above equilibrium) → a surplus.
- **Indirect tax** 间接税 (cuts demerit goods), **subsidy** 补贴 (raises merit goods), **regulation** 监管, **direct provision** 直接提供.



Exam: merit → under-consumed (subsidise); demerit → over-consumed (tax / regulate)

The public sector steps in for merit and demerit goods the market gets wrong

Answer shapes: an **Analyse** [up to 6] answer may use a price-control diagram;
Discuss [8] adds a judgement (Ev).

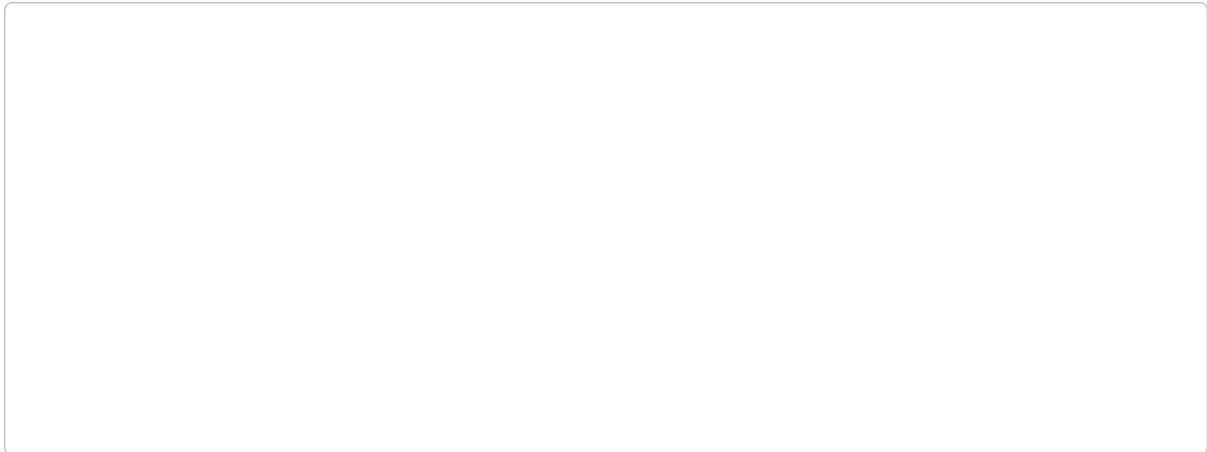
