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1. **30**

ETS says about 30 minutes and 50 items. The test is adaptive, so the exact time can vary.

2. **An adjective**

'Very' modifies adjectives and adverbs. Fixing the word class first removes most of the wrong answers before you think about meaning.

3. **No — 'except Sundays' removes Sunday from 'daily'**

One word reverses the sentence. These tasks are built around exactly this, which is why you mark exception words as you read.

4. **The topic sentence of each paragraph**

A topic sentence says what its paragraph is for. Matching against them turns re-reading the whole passage into four quick comparisons.

5. **50**

About 50 items across the three task types.

6. **The missing word is the opposite — something like 'successful'**

A contrast word promises a change of direction. That is a free clue and it appears constantly in this task.

7. **A polite instruction — submit a draft**

Academic English is indirect. Politeness is not optionality, and reading it as optional is a common and expensive mistake.

8. **False**

Spelling counts in this task. Reading the sentence back is what catches a missing -s or -ed.

9. **False**

It asks what the word means in THIS passage. Answer from the sentence, not from memory.

10. **False**

From January 2026 the test adapts. A stronger first block leads to a harder second block.
